Share and Take Turns (Learning to Get Along) by Cheri J:...
Learning to share, wait, and take turns are important skills for young children to learn, according to Goodstart Early Learning 's Troy Dunn. But for children under the age of three, not wanting or being able to share, wait or turn-take is a normal part of their development. Mr Dunn, Goodstart's national inclusive practices consultant, said in the early years, young children can develop attachments to both people and things, which can make it difficult for them to share them.
